	Whilst this gave me some exposure to plastic surgery, the vast majority of major procedures were not performed by the plastics team. Nonetheless, I was able to scrub in and assist in both partial and complete thyroidectomies, elective hysterectomies and observe a team of surgeons perform life-saving bowel surgery in patients with inflammatory bowel disease.
	My time away from theatres was spent appreciating and discussing the pre-operative assessment for elective patients and caring for post-operative patients with complications.
What were the best things about the visit? (120 words max)	Certainly one of the most rewarding highlights of my elective was to be given the opportunity to develop my basic surgical skills. Although there are very different protocols regarding infection control, scrubbing requirements and suturing techniques, it was a refreshing exposure to some of the differences between healthcare in Cuba and the United

Kingdom. What was also a rewarding opportunity was my ability to attend a variety of different surgical procedures and considering the late difficult I had in gaining exposure to plastic surgery in particular, my

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	appreciation of surgical as a broad specialty definitely flourished.
What problems did you encounter? (120 words max)	As mentioned above, I was told late on in my elective plans that spending the full amount of time in the plastics department was not possible. This was certainly not what I had planned and I spent a great deal of time trying to find ways of getting around this obvious stumbling block. However, with this in mind, I was still able to work amongst teams that regularly liaised with the plastics department and this gave me a novel appreciation of the specialty from a distance.

Would you recommend this to someone else? (explain if necessary)	For exposure to a novel and greatly successful healthcare system, Cuba is a fantastic place to travel to on an elective. Thought this is the case, it is essential to speak Spanish to a moderate/advanced conversational level.
