

BIOGRAPHIES

Professor Bruce Bauer, USA

Bruce S Bauer, MD, FACS, FAAP, is the Chief of Division of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery, Director of Paediatric Plastic Surgery at NorthShore University HealthSystem (Illinois, USA) and Clinical Professor of Surgery at the University of Chicago Pritzker School of Medicine.

Dr Bauer started his career at Children's Memorial Hospital in 1979 as a full-time specialist in paediatric plastic surgery and became chief of the service in 1986. While his practice covers the full spectrum of paediatric plastic surgery, he has a particular interest in treatment of large and giant melanocytic nevi (the largest surgical experience in the world) and paediatric tissue expansion for treatment of these patients. His long dedication to the paediatric subspecialty has resulted in national and international referrals of complex reconstructive problems in both children and adults requiring the specialised reconstructive techniques that he has developed. He has authored numerous papers and chapters related to his field, and co-edited and contributed extensively to *Principles and Practice of Paediatric Plastic Surgery* with Drs Michael Bentz and Ronald Zuker, published in 2008, a book which is recognised as the definitive text in the field.

Mr Sean Carroll, Ireland

Mr Sean M Carroll is a consultant in plastic surgery in St Vincent's University Hospital, Dublin 4 and has special interest in cosmetic surgery, general plastic surgery, hand surgery and microsurgery.

Sean qualified from the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland and undertook basic surgical training in Dublin before starting his plastic surgery training first in Dublin, then the UK. Sean then moved to the USA where he researched methods for improving muscle flap survival in plastic surgical operations. Following plastic surgery training, he went onto do a Fellowship in hand and cosmetic surgery at the Kleinert Institute of Hand surgery (USA) and the Toronto Institute of Cosmetic Surgery (Toronto). In 2000 Sean returned to Dublin and has been a consultant plastic surgeon in St. Vincent's University Hospital since.

He continues with his research still and his area of interest now lies in the development of skills training and skills assessment in plastic surgery. He has helped develop, for The Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland, skills assessment parameters currently in use in the selection of plastic surgical trainees. He is currently the director of microsurgical teaching programme in Ireland, and plastic surgery training programme director.

Ms Brid Crowley, UK

Bríd Crowley received her medical degree from University College Cork and undertook general surgery training at Cork University Hospital, Ireland. A year as research fellow in surgery at Brigham and Women's Hospital, Boston, USA followed. Plastic surgery training involved posts in Cork, Belfast and Plymouth and hand surgery fellowships in Adelaide and Sydney, Australia, which provided a sound base for a hand surgery-centred consultant practice.

As a consultant plastic and hand surgeon at the Royal Victoria Infirmary and the Great North Children's Hospital, Newcastle upon Tyne, UK, her clinical work focuses on hand and upper limb surgery. She has a particular interest in conditions of the hand and upper limb in children.

Active links are maintained with the Irish hand surgery fraternity through the Irish Hand Surgery Society of which she is currently president. Bríd is also FESSH delegate representing the Irish Hand Surgery Society, Examiner for European Board of Hand Surgery Diploma Examination and Examiner for the Diploma in Hand Surgery(BSSH).

Professor Peter Dziewulski, UK

Peter Dziewulski FFICM, FRCS, FRCS(Plast) is a consultant plastic and reconstructive surgeon. He has held a consultant post at the St Andrew's Centre for Plastic Surgery & Burns at Broomfield Hospital, Chelmsford, since 1998 and is Clinical Director of the burns unit. He is an honorary clinical lecturer at the Centre for Cutaneous Research, Institute of Cell and Molecular Science, Queen Mary's College, University of London and a visiting professor at StAAR, based at the Post Graduate Medical Institute, Anglia Ruskin University, Essex.

He trained in plastic surgery in Yorkshire, Newcastle and Texas, USA, and has a special interest in burn management. He belongs to the Court of Examiners at the Royal College of Surgeons of England. He is a past chairman of the British Burns Association and is on the editorial committee of the burns journal.

Miss Patricia Eadie, Ireland

Patricia Eadie graduated in medicine in 1981 from University College, Cork. She trained in general surgery in Ireland and has been a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland since 1985. She had a broad based international training in plastic surgery, spending time in Ireland, Memphis, Pittsburg, Melbourne and the UK, and received the FRCSI(Plast) in 1993. She was appointed as a consultant plastic surgeon in 1994 to St James's hospital and Our Lady's Children's hospital in Dublin. Her special interests include congenital and other aspects of hand surgery, breast surgery and aesthetic surgery.

She has been an active member of the Irish Association of Plastic surgeons and the Irish Hand Surgery Society, serving as various officers for both. She has been an examiner at the Intercollegiate exams and also at the European Boards for Plastic Reconstructive and Aesthetic Surgery for some years. She is currently the President of the Irish Association of Plastic surgeons.

Professor Michael Earley, Ireland

Michael was born in Dublin, Ireland, and carried out his medical degree and basic surgical training in Dublin and the South East. He moved to the UK in 1976, taking the FRCS in London in 1977. He trained in plastic surgery in Leicester, Manchester and the USA (on a three month BAPS fellowship). Michael obtained a consultant post in Chepstow, Wales, in 1985, and he was the first consultant to get the Intercollegiate specialist FRCS in plastic surgery. He wrote his MCh on the blood supply of the thumb in 1987. Michael moved back to Dublin in 1989 as a cleft, craniofacial, and head and neck reconstructive surgeon. He was President of BAPRAS in 2004 and the Craniofacial Society in 2006, has been a member of the RCSI Council since 2008 and Chair of the surgical council of Operation Smile since 2011.

Mr Fazel Fatah, UK

Fazel Fatah is a consultant plastic surgeon, retired from the NHS, and practices at The Westbourne Centre, Birmingham. He has wide experience of fat graft in breast and facial rejuvenation surgery and, in the past, has advised the National Institute of Clinical Excellence on matters related to the subject of fat graft. He is co-author of the current national guidelines on lipomodelling with fat graft in breast reconstructive surgery.

Dr David Fisher, Canada

David Fisher received his medical degree from the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland in 1990. He completed residencies in general and plastic surgery in Grand Rapids, Michigan and received American Board of Surgery Accreditation in General Surgery in 1997 and American Board of Plastic Surgery Accreditation in 2001. He became a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons of Canada in 1998. He undertook fellowship training in Paris with Dr Daniel Marchac, in Taiwan with Dr Samuel Noordhoff and Dr Yu-Ray Chen, and at The Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto, where he is the Medical Director of the Cleft Lip and Palate Program. His practice is entirely paediatric with a focus in cleft lip and palate and ear reconstruction. Dr Fisher is a member of the American Cleft Palate-Craniofacial Association, American Board of Surgery, American Society of Plastic Surgeons, Canadian Society of Plastic Surgeons and Operation Smile. Mr Kieran Horgan, UK

Kieran Horgan graduated from University College Dublin in 1979 and is a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland. He is accredited as a general surgeon and based in Leeds, United Kingdom. His major interest is in the management of breast disease and soft tissue sarcoma (Hospital Clinical Lead for Breast, Regional Lead for STS). Mr Horgan is a strong advocate of multidisciplinary team working and is also heavily involved in training (he is co-founder of English National Oncoplastic Fellowship Training Scheme). He is currently President of the Association of Breast Surgery, Associate Professor at the University of Leeds and Chair of the National Cancer Intelligence Network Breast Section.

Mr Kavan Johal, UK

Kavan Johal intercalated in biomedical sciences before graduating with honours in his undergraduate medical degree from the University of Nottingham. Subsequently he undertook the Academic Foundation Programme and then plastic surgery-themed core surgical training in the North Western Deanery. He is currently the BAAPS/Healing Foundation Surgical Research Fellow at the University of Manchester, investigating the role of adipose-derived stem cells as an adjunct towards improving autologous fat graft survival.

Dr Outi Kaarela, Finland

Outi Kaarela qualified as a specialist in plastic, reconstructive and aesthetic Surgery in 1994, in hand surgery in 1997, and in general surgery in 1992. She is currently Associate Professor in Plastic Surgery at Oulu University, a position she has held since 1999, and Surgeon in Chief of Plastic Surgery at Oulu University Hospital. Outi is a past president of the Finnish Plastic Surgical Association, and currently the Secretary General of UEMS section of plastic reconstructive and aesthetic surgery and the Finnish delegate for EBOPRAS.

Dr Leila Kasrai, Canada

Leila Kasrai received her medical degree from the University of Western Ontario, Canada. Dr Kasrai underwent plastic surgery residency training at the University of Toronto and became a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons of Canada in 1999. Dr Kasrai received her Masters in Public Health from Harvard University before accepting her appointment as a consultant plastic surgeon at St Joseph's Health Centre and the University of Toronto. She received her training in ear reconstruction from Dr Saturo Nagata in Tokyo, Japan.

She has held the position of Chief of Plastic Surgery at St Joseph's Health Centre where she was just awarded Teacher of the Year. Working with AMREF, the largest NGO in Africa, she has been researching risk factors leading to burns in children in Kenya. The goal is to use this data to develop culturally relevant, cost effective and sustainable burn prevention programs in Africa.

Professor Simon Kav. UK

Simon Kay was born in Kuwait in 1952, raised in Guernsey and educated at Shrewsbury and Oxford. After qualifying as a doctor he trained in surgery before starting a career in Plastic Surgery as a means to realising his goal to be a Hand Surgeon. He spent time in Australia and Kentucky USA refining skills in microsurgery before taking a Consultant post in Leeds Teaching Hospitals. There he spent 25 years developing the role of microsurgery in the reconstruction of children's hands after birth defects, and establishing a large major nerve injury service. He also became involved in organisation of the specialty, becoming President of two specialty associations and Editor of the major UK journal in this field. In the last three years he has focussed on the development of Hand Allografting, undertaking the UKs first hand transplant on December 2012

Mr Jack Kelly, Ireland

Mr Jack Kelly is a consultant plastic surgeon at University Hospital Galway and a senior lecturer at the National University of Ireland, Galway. He completed his postgraduate plastic surgery training in Ireland and has an MD by thesis from the Brigham & Women's Hospital and Harvard Medical School, Boston. This involved the investigation of T-cell mediated immune deficiency after major burn injury. Subsequent work in the Bernard O'Brien Institute of Microsurgery and St Vincent's Hospital, Melbourne, under Professor Wayne Morrison led to an interest in tissue engineering. During this time, a microsurgery fellowship and lab-based research included the use of tissue-engineered adipocyte constructs with an in-vivo model of vascular ingrowth. The research detailed the investigation of polymer scaffolds in a murine model to induce adiopocyte differentiation. A clinical burns fellowship with Dr David Herndon in Galveson, Texas, was a prelude to his appointment as a consultant plastic surgeon in Stoke Mandeville Hospital, Aylesbury.

In Galway, current research interests include a collaboration with the National Centre for Bioengineering Science (NCBES). Recent developments include the development of a bioengineered extracellular matrix for use in abdominal wall defects and a conduit for nerve regeneration in-vivo. He is the author of more than 50 peer-reviewed scientific papers and 150 national and international presentations.

Mr Aadil Khan, UK

Aadil is currently a Wellcome Trust training fellow in the final year of his PhD in free flap gene therapy at the Institute of Cancer Research and The Royal Marsden Hospital in London. He completed his medical training at Oxford University and obtained a Masters in public health at Harvard University before embarking on his higher surgical training in plastic surgery in the Oxford region. His doctoral thesis is on the radioprotection of free flaps using virally-delivered, therapeutic transgenes and the potential for translating this concept into clinical practice.

Mr Khalid Khan, UK

Mr Khalid Khan was appointed as a consultant plastic surgeon to the regional burn unit at the Royal Victoria Hospital Belfast in 1998. He has experience in burn care and trauma from the troubles in Northern Ireland including the Omagh bombing. He did voluntary work in Kashmir earthquake of 2005 and Gaza conflict of 2009. His other philanthropic activities include medical advice and help for the injured in the north-

west of Pakistan in the ongoing troubles and working for ATFAL which is a charity for Syrian children. Khalid's sub-specialty work includes burn care, breast reconstruction and gynae-oncology reconstruction including developmental abnormalities.

Professor Stephen Milner, USA

Stephen Milner is Professor of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine, Director of the Johns Hopkins Burn Center, Surgical Director of the Johns Hopkins Wound Healing Center and Director of the Michael D Hendrix Burn Research Center. He is Adjunct Professor at the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences and was formerly Honorary Civilian Consultant Advisor in Plastic Surgery and Burns to the British Army.

Dr Milner is a graduate of Guy's Hospital Medical and Dental Schools. He trained in general surgery in London and at the Massachusetts General Hospital. After service as a lieutenant colonel in the Royal Army Medical Corps, where he served on active duty in Operation Desert Storm, he completed a plastic surgery residency through the University of Texas and the Shriner's Burn Institute in Galveston. Amongst his numerous publications he has authored more than 100 peer-reviewed articles and is founding editor of ePlasty.

Guest Lecturer Sushruta-Guha Lecture, Friday 29 November

Professor V B Narayanamurthy, India

Professor Murthy passed his MBBS with several awards and a gold medal at Stanley Medical College Madras India. He gained a short-term scientific scholarship to do work in plastic surgery as an undergraduate student. With an interest in insensate sole, almost 20 years ago he presented 'the outcome of free flaps in the foot' at the summer meeting of BAPS July 1993 in Oxford. On his return to India, he was confronted with the lack of understanding on how to look after the reconstructed diabetic foot and non-availability of surveillance methods and appropriate footwear. Several projects on and with the help of two PhD theses, he and his team were able to develop a credible surveillance system to prevent ulcers and keep healed wounds healed. In 2004, he conferred the Adjunct Professorship in the Department of Biomedical Engineering at the Indian Institute of Technology Madras.

Professor Murthy is one of the founding members of the Hyperbaric Society of India, and Managing Director of HYCARE for wounds, a centre dedicated exclusively to the treatment of wounds.

Mr Joe O'Donoghue, UK

Joe O'Donoghue is a plastic surgeon with a special interest in microvascular breast reconstruction and oncoplastic breast surgery. He works in the Newcastle upon Tyne NHS Trust. He completed a Master's degree in breast cancer immunology before embarking on his plastic surgery training which he completed with a fellowship in oncoplastic breast surgery at the Institut Marie Curie, Paris in 1998 under the direction of Krishna Clough. He has co-authored the UK national lipomodelling guidelines and is a member of the national oncoplastic breast surgery guidelines writing group.

A past chairman of BAPRAS' Education Committee, he is currently the Honorary Secretary, acts as plastic surgery editor for ISCP and has written the plastic surgery advanced years curriculum in oncoplastic breast surgery, which is under review by the GMC. Mr Graeme Perks. UK

Graeme qualified MBBS (with a distinction in surgery) in 1979 from Kings College Hospital, London before training at junior surgical level in London, Sheffield and Newcastle. He became a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons in 1984 before moving to Melbourne Australia.

After a year in general surgery he worked for two years as a lecturer with a research interest in transplant organ rejection. Graeme was selected for the Australian national plastic surgery programme which he completed in 1991. He returned to the UK for further training in Preston, Royal Marsden Hospital, London before securing a senior registrar post at Withington Hospital Manchester.

He obtained the FRCS(Plast) in 1994 and was appointed as a consultant in Nottingham in 1995. His special interest in microsurgical reconstruction after cancer surgery allowed him to develop good working relationships with a wide range of other surgical specialities. Graeme is Head of the Department of Plastic, Reconstructive and Burns Surgery at Nottingham University Hospitals NHS Trust where his greatest pleasure is seeing his former trainees surpass him.

Professor Malcolm Reed. UK

Professor Reed was educated in Birmingham and graduated from medicine at the University of Sheffield in 1981. He undertook postgraduate surgical training in the West Midlands before undertaking a period of research in the United States, returning to Sheffield in 1988. He was appointed to the Foundation Chair of Surgical Oncology in 2009. His major areas of clinical practice are oncoplastic breast surgery and soft tissue sarcoma. His research in breast cancer focuses on factors affecting patient choice in surgical treatments and the management of older women with breast cancer. He is the principle or co-investigator on a number of national randomised controlled trials and cohort studies and is a member of the Government Advisory Committee on Breast Cancer Screening. He is Head of the Department of Oncology at The University of Sheffield and has over 200 publications relating to his clinical, laboratory and basic science research programmes.

Mr Odhran Shelley, Ireland

Odhran Shelley graduated in medicine from the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland in 1993, and completed his basic surgical training in Dublin. He was appointed as a burn and trauma fellow at Glasgow Royal Infirmary, and moved to Boston where he completed two years researching interactions between innate and adaptive immunity following burn injury. The Brigham and Women's Hospital/Harvard Medical School awarded him the Mannick research award for best resident research in 2000. He returned to Scotland and completed his training in plastic surgery at the Canniesburn plastic surgery unit in Glasgow. He completed fellowships in burns, breast and microsurgery, and aesthetic surgery and was awarded scholarships to Slovenia and Belgium. He was appointed as a consultant plastic surgeon at St Andrews Centre for Plastic Surgery and Burns, Chelmsford in 2006 and subsequently became its clinical director. He was appointed director of the national burns unit in Dublin in 2011. He is also a director of Resurge Africa and has an interest in training plastic surgeons in developing countries.

Dr Klaus Ueberreiter studied medicine at the Free University, Berlin. He wrote his thesis about intestinal parasitis including twelve months of field studies in Bolivia. Thereafter he undertook specialised training in Berlin at Hannover University to become both a German and European board-certified plastic surgeon. Since 2007 he developed the BEAULI method of mega volume fat graft especially for breast reconstruction and augmentation. 1/2012 he founded with two colleagues his own private hospital of plastic surgery, the Park-Klinik Birkenwerder/ Berlin, which he is leading now.





13:30 Guided tour of Trinity College and the National Gallery of Ireland

09:30 Day tour of County Wicklow

Meet your tour guide at the BAPRAS registration desk in the Convention Centre Dublin (conference venue) and depart by private coach.

The tour will take you along the great sweep of Dublin Bay, past Dun Laoghaire's elegant promenade and yacht-filled harbour, to James Joyce's Tower at Sandycove. The sea views are unsurpassed.

The tour climbs into the beautiful Wicklow Mountains and continues through the enchanting old-world village of Enniskerry to Powerscourt House & Gardens. Where Powerscourt House stands today, there was once a 13th century medieval castle, which contained some of the finest 18th century interiors in Ireland.. Tragically in 1974 a fire broke out and much of the house was destroyed. It was restored and re-opened in 1996, although not to its original glory and is now home to the best of Irish design in gifts, clothes, and furniture as well as the Avoca Café, offering the finest in artisan food and home cooked cuisine.
