It is a great pleasure to welcome you all back to London for the BAPRAS Winter Meeting, following our very successful meeting with the Irish Association of Plastic Surgeons, in Dublin last winter

On Wednesday, we focus on wound healing, with a guest lecture from Professor John Greenwood

(Adelaide, South Australia), then with parallel sessions celebrating humanitarian and overseas aid, with guests including Dr Hinne Rakhorst (the Netherlands), whilst the parallel Reconstructive Surgery Trials Network session welcomes Professor Lars Steinsträßer (Germany). This is the first such RSTN session and celebrates the work of the Association in this field. This leads into the President's Prize session which aims to celebrate the excellent and inspiring work done by trainees in the field of research. The day finishes with a guest lecture by Professor J T Kim (Korea), on the history of microsurgery, in my opinion, one of the most important things to remember in where we have come to in the progress of our specialty.

The Wednesday evening is particularly special to follow on from the overseas and humanitarian presentations, in the launch of BFIRST, our charity dedicated to working to aid development of plastic and reconstructive surgery through charitable links with developing nations.

Thursday is a day to celebrate microsurgery and we are very privileged to have many overseas speakers, as well as our local experts. Professor Stefan Hofer (Toronto, Canada), the long-serving JPRAS Editor, gives an invited address and there are international contributions from Mr Arif Turkmen (Turkey), Professor Kim and Dr Marc Mureau (Netherlands). The important work on a flap database being developed by BAPRAS, ably led by Anita Hazari will be presented that afternoon. In the evening we have the

pleasure of the Association dinner, to be held at Stationers Hall- I hope to see many of you there.

On Friday, we share more presentations and debate on the topics of cleft and craniofacial surgery and aesthetic surgery, where we welcome Dr Konstantin Lipski (Russia) to give a presentation to be followed by my successor, incoming President Nigel Mercer, and his BAAPS counterpart, Michael Cadier. Then we are privileged to have Richard Marchant present the General Medical Council's plans for credentialing in aesthetic surgery, which will be of great importance to all of us, given the changing regulations in aesthetic surgery. Parallel to the aesthetic session, we have a very high class limbs session, in which Professor Kim will once again be speaking.

On Friday afternoon we are lucky to have a session with presentations from breast implant manufacturers, coordinated by Elaine Sassoon, as part of a session on aesthetic breast surgery.

My hope is that you will come and meet new colleagues, make new friends and go away inspired to be more thoughtful and considerate in the way in which you practice, for the benefit of patients and trainees.

It has been a great privilege to serve as the first two year BAPRAS President and I would like to thank Helen Roberts, Gemma Adlington, Shreena Dholakia, Sharon Ross, Joanna Hall, Judy Richards and Angela Rausch, in the BAPRAS Secretariat, without whom none of this would happen, and of course my colleagues on BAPRAS Council.

I wish you all a very inspiring three days!


FLOOR PLAN: EDWARD LUMLEY HALL


FLOOR PLAN: COUNCIL ROOM

The world's worst train disaster occurred on 4th June 1989 in the Urals area of Russia towards the end of the Cold War. An unprecedented and what would have previously been an unthinkable request was made to the Soviet government for help. Through BAPS (as it then was) a hastily assembled team went to the city of Chelyabinsk where the greatest number of victims had been evacuated to

The team had virtually no knowledge of what the conditions would be and none of what life was like generally for people living in that part of the Soviet

Union, thought the words glasnost and perestroika had become familiar. The exhibition shows "official" and reality photos and dissident material from that time and life as seen in paintings by children and young artists as well.

The exhibition also shows what the team found clinically, what it was able to achieve and the political consequences. It could be sub-titled "Childrens' art has no Frontiers"
